## IDEC Call For 2012 Nominations

Looking for a way to get more involved in advocating for young children with disabilities, those at-risk for developing disabilities, and their families? IDEC has leadership positions available in which YOU can make a difference!

Currently, there are two positions that need to be filled by election: Vice-President and Treasurer. The elected officers will begin their terms on July 1, 2012.

The **IDEC Vice-President** gradually assumes more responsibility for leadership rather than being immediately thrust into the position of President. The Vice-President cycles through three other positions (President-Elect, President, Past President), thus committing to four years of participation. Although this sounds like a long time, it works to the Vice-President's advantage with regard to working with and being mentored by the other officers currently in these positions. As outlined in the IDEC By-Laws, specific tasks of the Vice-President include the following: (a) serve in the President's place and with his/her authority in the case of absence or inability of the President and President-Elect;

(b) accept designated responsibilities that will provide training experiences that offer advancement to the office of President-Elect and President; and

(c) serve as Chair (or Co-Chair) of a committee on the Sharing A Vision (SAV) state conference planning committee, assisting the President-elect as necessary; and

(d) serve as the liaison with the Illinois Council for Exceptional Children (ICEC).

The **IDEC Treasurer** serves a two-year term. Per the IDEC By-Laws, the tasks include the following:

(a) make an annual report of the financial status of the subdivision to the Executive Board and at the annual business meeting;

(b) prepare and submit an annual budget for approval by the Executive Board and at the annual business meeting;

(c) arrange for annual audit at the conclusion of the fiscal year, June 30, by a certified public account;

(d) serve as the fiscal agent for the bi-annual state conference "Sharing A Vision" (SAV);

(e) be responsible for Subdivision banking and all phases of bookkeeping;

(f) function as the chair of the state conference SAV budget committee and supervise development of the budget;

(g) present the state conference SAV budget to the Executive Board for approval;

(h) have check writing privileges along with the IDEC President; and

(i) annually renew the articles of incorporation for 501(c)3 status.

### Bernie Laumann is Winner of JAM Award!

Bernadette "Bernie" Laumann was named as the 2011 winner of the Jeanette A. McCollum (JAM) Award for Service to the Field by the Illinois Division of Early Childhood (IDEC). The announcement took place on Tuesday, September 27, 2011 at the Sharing A Vision early childhood conference held in Springfield, Illinois. The Jeanette A. McCollum Award for Service to the Field is presented to an early childhood professional, family member, student, or community member who meets high-standards of professional practice and leadership set by Jeanette A. McCollum, Professor Emeritus at the University of Illinois – Urbana/Champaign. The winner must have made significant contributions on a state, regional, or local level which have improved or will improve the lives of young children with special needs, their families, or those who work on their behalf. Bernie was chosen by a committee of IDEC members including LuAnn Shields and Kristy Herrell, Prairie Children Preschool, IPSD # 204; Jennifer Loncola Walberg, Associate Professor, DePaul University and Wu-Ying Hsieh, Assistant Professor, University of Illinois at Chicago.

Bernie was nominated by a joint committee of her former colleagues at the University of Illinois – Urbana/Champaign, including Drs. Mary-alayne Hughes, Micki Ostrosky, Amy Santos and Susan Fowler. A few of the many highlights from the nomination letters submitted by these four colleagues and three additional colleagues who also wrote letters of support are provided below.

According to Dr. Hughes, "Bernie has worked tirelessly on behalf of young children with disabilities and their families for over 30 years. She has a wealth of experience across a broad range of Early Childhood Special Education (ECSE) roles, including serving as an ECSE teacher and principal of one of the first inclusive preschool programs in the state of Illinois. In her role as principal, she worked diligently with the classroom teachers and staff to make the inclusive early childhood program a model site in the state of Illinois." As indicated by Dr. Susan Maude, Iowa State University, "Dr. Laumann's program was one of seven sites out of 50 recognized as a Finalist in the Search for Exemplary Practices. She also gave generously of her time to educate program visitors about developing inclusive educational opportunities for children in their own sites." Additionally, Dr. Laumann has worked in a variety of capacities in the University of Illinois' Department of Special Education and was included on the University's "Teachers Ranked as Excellent" list a total of 17 semesters! One of her former students, Laura Czopek, who is now a Developmental Therapist, said, "Bernie demonstrated her vast understanding of the field of early childhood and presented class material in a creatively organized and easy-to-understand fashion. She helped many college students find success in the college classroom, in turn, positively impacting the lives of countless young children." Bernie is continuing to train new teachers at Eastern Illinois University. One of her new colleagues at Eastern, Dr. Rebecca Cook, stated the following: "Bernie's career appears to be driven by priorities to have high expectations of teacher candidates, strong collaborative relationships within and across fields, a tireless consumption of research, in-depth knowledge of current issues, and being a strong proponent of families and their pivotal role in their children's development."

Each letter writer also commented on Bernie's outstanding leadership abilities. She is a "quiet" leader who simply gets things done without a lot of fanfare. She has served IDEC in various roles, including President, and she capably served as the Chairperson of the Past President's Council, a position created especially to keep her on the board and to develop new leaders in the organization.

Finally, please note the following comments written by Jeanette McCollum, for whom the award is named, which were shared at the time of the announcement. She knew that Bernie had been chosen as the 2011 winner of the award named in her honor and although she could not be present to congratulate Bernie in person, she asked that these words be shared on her behalf.

"Bernie - I feel like I've known you most of my professional career, and so am wondering why I'm still older than you are! You came to the U of I in what was, I think, my second year of teaching. I remember your cohort with great fondness because you were all eager to learn and very supportive of one another. In these respects you haven't changed very much! You have had a successful career as a teacher and as an administrator. Teacher education has always been your passion, whether as an administrator or more recently as a college teacher and now professor. You have always set your standards high, and have never wavered in your commitment to high quality early childhood education. I am very proud of you, and proud to have been one of your mentors. And of course proud that you were selected for this award. "

### Literacy Resources for Infants and Preschoolers from Washington Learning Systems

The Washington Learning Systems in Seattle, Washington has been developing research-based early literacy materials since 2004. Resources for preschoolers include *Supporting Early Literacy in Natural Environments* which are suggested activities for parents, caregivers, and young children. There are 46 activities for home and community. Each activity includes a description, hints for making the activity fun and developmentally appropriate, and a self-evaluation that guides adults to notice children's skills and to examine and increase their own interactions with children. Activities are in pdf format and available in English, Spanish, Vietnamese, Mandarin, Somali, Burmese, and Russian. A similar set of activities is available for promoting early literacy with infants. ## Interested in how to prepare teachers to work in blended early childhood programs?

**Project Blend** is a new leadership training program in the Department of Special Education at the University of Illinois. The program is funded by the Office of Special Education Programs of the US Department of Education and is designed to prepare doctoral students to become leaders in developing blended teacher preparation programs in early childhood education, early childhood special education, and early intervention.

Project Blend graduates will earn a PhD and be qualified to develop and sustain teacher preparation programs that prepare new teachers to meet the needs of children with diverse abilities including children identified with or at-risk for developmental delays, as well as those diagnosed with a specific disability.

Students will be immersed in rigorous research focused on issues that support the development and effective delivery of inclusive preschool programs and early intervention services.

Project Blend focuses on four areas of competency:

- (1) Knowledge of disability law and educational policy for children, birth to 5.
- (2) Ability to improve child outcomes through rigorous research and data-based decision making.
- (3) Skills to translate research into practice.
- (4) Ability to align early childhood curriculum to current state standards for early learning.

Students will acquire these competencies through coursework, a seminar series, fulfillment of doctoral requirements, and experiential learning that include:

- *Participation in internship related to state and federal policy development and implementation.*
- Internship on the translation of research into practice.
- Co-teaching of required ECE/ECSE/EI pre-service courses.
- Supervising pre-service teachers in blended programs.

Full-time students funded through Project Blend will receive a competitive monthly stipend, tuition waiver, and yearly research and conference travel allowance. Students must be a US citizen or lawful permanent resident to qualify for funding.

#### **Preparing Relationship-based Early Intervention & Early Childhood Special Education Personnel:** PREP II Project

The Early Childhood Special Education (ECSE) program in the Department of Special Education at the University of Illinois at Urbana-Champaign has been awarded federal funding (PREP II Project) to support students interested in earning a **master's degree**, with an emphasis on working with young children, ages birth to six, with disabilities and their families. This is a 2 year full-time program of study on the Champaign-Urbana campus. There are no online courses at the present time.

Interested individuals should apply to the graduate program in the Department of Special Education.



Dr. McWilliam is the Past President of the CEC Division for Research and is on the steering committee for CEC's efforts to define and identify evidence-based practices in special education. Dr. McWilliam's workshops are highly interactive and applied, and he is in constant demand as a speaker and consultant, throughout the U.S. and in Europe.
